Annual Report to Parliament on the Administration of the Access to Information Act

April 1, 2018 – March 31, 2019

1. Introduction

The purpose of the *Access to Information Act* (the "Act") is to provide individuals and corporations present in Canada with a right of access to records under the control of federal government institutions. The principles encompassed by the Act are that government information should be available to the public, necessary exceptions to the right of access should be limited and specific, and that decisions on the disclosure of government information should be reviewed independently of government.

The Act also specifies that it is intended to complement existing procedures for obtaining government information and is not to limit in any way the type of information that is normally available to the public, thereby denoting the importance of informal access.

This report is prepared and tabled in Parliament in accordance with section 72 of the *Access to Information Act.*

The Canadian Commercial Corporation (CCC), a Crown corporation listed in Schedule III, Part I of the *Financial Administration Act*, reports to Parliament through the Minister of International Trade. CCC has a mandate to facilitate international trade and acts as Canada's international contracting and procurement agency.

The Corporation's primary service involves the establishment of government-to-government contracts with foreign government buyers to provide goods and services available for export from Canada. CCC then enters into contracts with Canadian exporters to fulfill the requirements of these government-to-government contracts. The procurement and contracting services provided for the benefit of Canadian exporters allows them to access markets where risk, transparency and competitiveness require a government-to-government arrangement.

While CCC is actively engaged in the aerospace, defence, security and infrastructure sectors, it also supports emerging and developing markets such as clean tech and communication technology where foreign governments may require additional capacity to undertake complex and timely projects. CCC can operate either as prime contractor selling to governments, or as a procurement agent sourcing Canadian goods and services on behalf of governments in other countries. The Corporation also procures goods and services on behalf of other federal government institutions to assist the Government of Canada fulfill its in-kind aid contributions worldwide.



2. Organizational Structure

The Access to Information Act is administered by the Corporation's Legal Services division. Legal Services is responsible for responding to all requests submitted to CCC under the Act, developing internal policies and procedures, providing training and awareness to all staff, and ensuring compliance with the Act, its regulations and related policy instruments.

The role of CCC's ATIP Coordinator is delegated to the Vice President of Legal Services, who is a member of the Corporation's executive committee and reports directly to the President. The Legal Services office has one full time incumbent dedicated to carrying out all access to information activities, including the processing of requests. The position is supported by other legal counsels and an administrative assistant as needed. During this reporting period, it was also necessary to hire an outside consultant to support this role during the incumbent's absence.

3. Delegation Order

For the purposes of section 3 of the Access to Information Act, the President of CCC is the head of the institution.

Pursuant to section 73 of the Act, the President's authority has been delegated to enable the Corporation to meet its legislated requirements. The President has delegated all of his powers, duties and functions under the Act to the Vice-President Legal Services, General Counsel and Corporate Secretary, who is also the ATIP Coordinator.

A copy of the Delegation Order, dated April 20, 2015, is attached as Annex A.

4. Highlights of the Statistical Report, 2018-2019

During this reporting period, CCC processed and closed a total of 69 requests for information under the *Access to Information Act*. Of these requests, 20 were formal requests received by CCC, 15 were consultations received from other government institutions and 34 were informal requests for previously released information.

A copy of the Statistical Report on the *Access to Information Act* that was submitted to the Treasury Board of Canada, is attached as Annex B.

A copy of the new exemptions tables that submitted with the Statistical Report on the *Access to Information Act* to the Treasury Board of Canada, is attached as Annex C.

Formal Requests

After receiving a lower number of requests last fiscal year as compared to the two previous reporting periods, CCC received 18 formal requests during 2018-2019 and also processed an additional 4 requests that were carried over from 2017-2018. Of these, 20 requests were closed and 2 carried forward to the next reporting period.



Of the 20 formal requests that CCC closed during 2018-2019, extensions of the statutory due date to respond to them was taken on 5 of them. The extensions were the result of consultations required with other government institutions.

CCC processed a total of 826 pages during 2018-2019, of which 523 pages were disclosed in full or in part.


CCC had no deemed refusal requests during the 2018-2019 reporting period with 100% completion on time.

Due to the nature of CCC's activities involving contractual negotiations between foreign governments and Canadian exporters, CCC frequently applies exemptions under section 15 and section 20 of the Act in order to protect international affairs and the commercial interests of third parties.

Consultation Requests

CCC received and processed 15 consultation requests from another government during this 2018-2019 reporting period. No consultation requests will be carried forward to the next reporting period.

5. Training

The CCC ATIP Office offers informal training throughout the year to employees as and when needed.

6. Policy, Guidelines and Procedures

During this reporting period, in anticipation of Bill C-58 and the proposed amendments to the Access to Information Act receiving royal accent, CCC reviewed and revised it's internal procedures for the modified proactive disclosure of its travel and hospitality expenses and processing requests submitted under the *Access to Information Act*.

Once Bill C-58 receives royal accent, these revised internal procedures will come into force and will complement our *Access to Information Policy* approved during the reporting period of 2016-2017.

7. Complaints and Investigations

During this reporting period, CCC received no new complaints submitted to the Office of the Information Commissioner (OIC).

CCC carried forward 10 complaints with the Office of the Information Commissioner (OIC) from 2017-2018. 4 of these complaints were closed during 2018-2019, of which, 2 were well founded and 2 not well founded. In regards to the 4 complaints which were closed, no further action was required by CCC, as a result of these findings.

Of the remaining 6 complaints being carried forward to the next 2019-2020 reporting period, exemption analysis worksheets and final responses have been completed for 4, for which we are still awaiting a final report of findings from the OIC before officially closing them.

8. Time Monitoring to Process Requests

The CCC ATIP office utilizes the Privasoft case management software as a tool to monitor the time taken to process all access to information requests.

As CCC completed all requests, 100% on time, no other monitoring of time was necessary.
